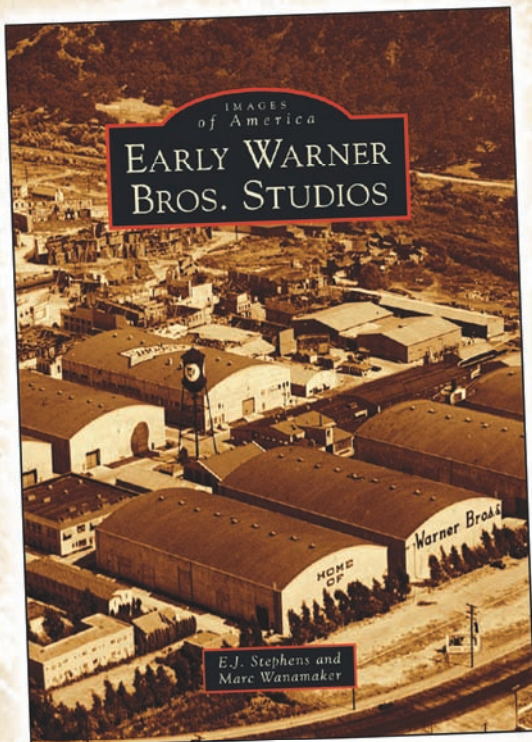

Jack who rose from the humblest of origins to become Hollywood moguls of enormous and lasting influence. Since 1928, Warner Bros. has produced thousands of beloved films and timeless classics, such as *Casablanca*, *The Maltese Falcon*, and *East of Eden*, at the studio's magical 110-acre film factory in Burbank. Stephens's book, which will be available for sale before and after the presentation, includes a collection of rare and evocative images that highlights the Warner Bros. legacy from the 1920s to the 1950s.
